## **About the 2021 National Church Life Survey**

The National Church Life Survey (NCLS) is a major survey of churches and church attenders carried out every five years in Australia since 1991.

Each NCLS involves hundreds of thousands of church attenders across more than 20 denominations and movements, including Catholic, Anglican and all the major Protestant denominations in Australia.

#### **Survey Types**

Both hard copy and online survey forms were available.

The "NCLS Attender Survey" was completed by church attenders aged 15 years and older, usually during or after a service of worship.

The "NCLS Census Survey" about the activities and operations of the local church was completed by a single leader/administrator in each church.

#### **Ethics**

The 2021 NCLS received Human Research Ethics Approval from Charles Sturt University (Ref: H21355).


#### Method

The main attender survey is known as "NCLS Attender Survey A" and is available in a number of languages. Attender Survey A was completed by 85% respondents in each denomination in 2021. The variant of Attender Survey A (ABA) completed by attenders of Baptist Churches around Australia included several questions commissioned by the Australian Baptist Ministries. They were distributed across Baptist churches around Australia and was completed by 7,387 church attenders.

The remaining attenders receive one of a range of Attender Sample Survey forms, which include a core component from Attender Survey A, and additional questions unique to the sample variant. These small surveys (between 20 and 30 in each wave) progress a wide range of research agendas beyond church health and are included at random in the bundle of survey forms ordered by the church.

#### **Error Rates**

The maximum margin of error on a simple random sample of 1,406 at a 95% level of confidence is 2.6%. That is, assuming a simple random sample, there is a 95% chance that a sample result falls within ±2.6% of the result for the Australian churchgoing population.

# UNDERSTAND THE BIG


Jesus calls his people to make disciples of all nations (Matthew 28:19, 20).

# Church health/vitality: NCLS Research model




Goal-focused: What a church seeks to achieve

# Church health: NCLS Core Qualities model




NCLS Research describes nine Core Qualities and three attendance measures which are central to the life of a vital and healthy church.






# UNDERSTAND THE BIG

## Research findings about faith-sharing

Finding 1: Inviting others to church is positively linked with church growth and attracting newcomers.



Finding 2: An inter-related quality. When a church is strong in this quality, it is associated with being strong in many other qualities.

89% talk about matters of faith with other members of their household (8% live alone)



# Two in ten Baptists are active evangelists

20% feel at ease talking about faith with others and look for opportunities to do so.



Frequency of sharing faith in a secular space in the last year

# Three in ten Baptists frequently shared faith in secular spaces with someone they knew

29% have frequently (at least monthly) shared their faith Six in ten had 'occasionally' shared their faith (59%) One in ten 'never' shared their faith in this way (12%).

In the last year, how often have you mentioned or shared your faith with someone you know through a secular workplace, club, school etc?






#### Shared your faith with someone you know by Age

# Younger Baptist attenders are *more* likely to share faith frequently than older attenders

41% of attenders aged 15-29 year shared their faith 'at least weekly or monthly'.

This decreases with increasing age to 20% of attenders aged 70+ years






### **Sharing Christian content on social media**

# Sharing Christian content on social media/web in order to share faith with others is not common

43% of Baptist attenders reported they had 'never' shared Christian content on social media/web with others in the last year to share their faith


41% 'occasionally' shared Christian content on social media/web to share their faith In the last year, how often have you shared Christian content on social media/web in order to share your faith with others?





# The frequency of sharing Christian content on social media/web to share faith in the last year differed slightly by age

The proportion of attenders reporting they had 'never shared' Christian content on social media/web to share their faith, was highest in attenders aged 70+ years (50%) and lowest in attenders aged 30-49 years (38%).








#### When most likely to share faith

# Situations when most likely to share faith differ by age.

As **age increases**, attenders are more likely to be **comfortable to share faith** in most situations.




#### When most likely to share faith by Age (key findings)

**Younger** attenders are more likely to share faith:

- In a relaxed environment with friends/ acquaintances
- When faith is vibrant and God seems close
- After seeing somebody else do it

Younger attenders are also more likely to struggle to share their faith due to worry about what others may think.

# **Evaluation - equipped to share faith**




#### How well equipped do you feel to share your faith?

47%


of attenders felt well equipped to share their faith (rating 4 or 5)

# Suitability of local church for non-Christian/ enquirer





# of newcomers felt that the church was great for beginners

whilst only 40% of those who were attenders for more 5 years felt the same.

Some 44% of visitors felt that the local church was reasonably good for beginners but could be better.




To what extent do you feel that this church is a good one to invite a (non-Christian or enquiring) friend to?



The proportion of Baptist attenders involved in local church evangelistic activities has declined over time


# Involved in evangelistic or outreach activities at local church: 2006 to 2021


#### **Approaches to sharing faith**

#### Approaches to sharing faith: 2006 to 2021

Confidence to invite has eroded.

In 2021/2227% were willing and invited someone.

49% were willing but didn't invite someone.

14% probably or definitely wouldn't invite someone to church


How willing are you to invite to a church service here any friends/relatives who don't currently attend a church?





# Three in ten

Australians are likely to go to church if invited by close friends and family

Apart from such special occasions as weddings, funerals, etc., would you go to a Christian church service if invited by close friends or family?

31% said 'yes/probably' 16% were not sure 27% said 'no/probably not'

NB: 26% did not choose a response to the scenario. They noted they did not have friends or family who attend.

## Relationship:

If I felt that it was important to my friend or family member that I accept

## Hospitable:

If I could be confident that I would be made to feel welcome

### Service:

If the church was doing good work in the community (e.g. supporting vulnerable people)

### Convenient:

If the church was convenient for me to get to

### Inclusive:

If the church was inclusive of people of all sexualities and genders

## Timely:

If the church service was short and wouldn't take much of my time

### Social:

If I had an opportunity to informally talk with other people at the church when I visited

#### Clear:

If my friend/family member explained to me what happens at a church service





- Baptist attenders strongly engage faith in their households
- Two in ten are active evangelists looking for opportunities to share faith.
- Three in ten share faith frequently in secular environments (at least monthly).
- Sharing Christian content on social media/web in order to share faith with others is not common
- 56% were most likely to share their faith in a relaxed space with people they know
- Just under half felt well equipped to share their faith

NCLS

45% of Baptist attenders feel that their church is great for beginners. A
further 37% feel that it is reasonably good, but it could be better.

- Fewer Baptist attenders are involved in church evangelistic activities than before
- The confidence to invite others to church has been eroded
- However, we learn from Australians that three in 10 are likely to accept an invitation.
- Relationships are vital.
